The Venable Spirit

Pictures of Inspiring Leaders

If you would "behold the bright countenance of truth in the quiet and still air of delightful studies," with me through the white columned portals of Venable School and visit our happy school community. There you will meet seven hundred and thirty boys and girls who, under the guidance of their principal, office teacher, and seventeen homeroom teachers, are, in the words of our Superintendent, becoming "true pilots for progressive education and creative citizenship.'

Look about you as you enter. Shafts of sunlight fall upon a picture of the immortal Lee and you immediately recall his watchword of "duty" which is a part of every Venable child's honor code. Near Lee is the picture of Colonel Venable for whom our school was named, a man who lived "a life that lifted other lives to higher planes of thought and purpose." Across from this portrait is the everinspiring picture of our own Jefferson who planned and built Virginia's University, hoping that down through the years each young man of his state privileged to attend there would 'study to show himself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not be ashamed.'

Worthy of a place in any group of the eminent sons of Virginia, there also hangs a fourth portrait, that of Dr. Thomas Leonard Watson, Professor of Geology in the University of Virginia, State Geologist of Virginia, a trained, practical scientist who made the geology of Virginia speak concretely to the citizenship of the Commonwealth. He was a profound scholar of national repute in his special field; as a class room teacher he led his students with an inspiring and infectious enthusiasm. He was a citizen with broad tastes and his loyalty as a school patron was of the highest type. For more than eight years (September 25, 1916, to the day of his death, November 15, 1924), he was a member of the School Board of the City of Charlottesville, in which capacity his services are best described in a tribute spread upon the minutes of the School Board at a meeting held at McGuffey School on Thursday, November 20, 1924, at which time were present: Thomas J. Michie, chairman; Mrs. G. F. Spitzer,

Miss Effie M. Gleason; F. B. Peyton; and John S. Patton.

"As a man we found him possessing in his own nature such qualities of manhood, frankness, courtly bearing, sincerity, affection and common sense as to win and hold the high regard of his associates.

As a scholar his fund of information was such as to induce us all to give weighty consideration to any suggestions made by him. His scholarship, broad and deep, never appeared to better advantage than when some grave problems confronted the schools, problems challenging the best in men's souls and hearts to reach proper solution.

As a business man his opinions were always based upon sound economic principles, his whole-hearted support of a business venture carried conviction and brought action.

As a leader for better schools in the city and the state his voice was ever potent and his efforts bore rich fruit in many fields. Our last constructive move to expand and improve the facilities for the children aroused his enthusiasm and enlisted his most ardent and devoted support.

As a friend his entire nature radiated sympathy, kindliness, fidelity and abiding love, the memory of which to us is a priceless possession.

As a school board member he measured up to all those qualities that make for high-minded, unselfish service; his vision was never dimmed by temporary expedients; he always spoke and acted with the courage of his convictions; his conclusions were based upon sound premises but always seasoned with common sense and a deeply human touch. One could feel the pulse beat of the warmhearted man in his earnest advocacy of any policy.

We shall see him no more in the flesh but his spirit lives with us; his example stands forth calling upon us to carry on the great work of which he was so large a part."

A copy of the above tribute was signed by every member of the Board and was transmitted to the family of Dr. Watson.

consideration was the naming of the new primary school. Dr. Watson was a member of the committee to report on this matter and he strongly urged that the new primary school be named in honor of Col. Charles S. Venable. At the regular meeting of the School Board held Thursday night, November 20, 1924, the new school in process of construction was officially named "Venable Primary School." paragraphs in reference to Dr. Watson were written by James G. The spirit of our school was formed back through the years by these and similar great leaders, who inspired many a youth to become a seeker of truth. Venable students, young but not too young to catch this glorious inspiration, formed with the guidance of their teachers, a creed of school life in their own simple childish way, and here you see it hanging framed in red and black, the school colors:

I believe in my school, In the dream and plan of her founders, In her place among other schools, In her standards of honor and truth. I believe that her name must be protected.

Her privileges cherished, Her colors defended.

I believe in loyalty to my school, utter, unchangeable.

Activities That Train in Leadership

Down through the long corridors you pass slowly, each open classroom door an invitation to enter and find children happy and busy in their activities. Here is a class of youngsters grouped in small chairs in a reading circle wholly absorbed in their new readers, while another group in a corner of ferns and sunlight are beginning their interest in science in a study of life in an aquarium. Strains of victrola music greet you at the next door and childish voices join in with the recorded voice of a famous opera singer, "Holy night, silent night", and you know that Christmas assembly plans are in the air. Bent heads and furrowed brows in the next class-room. Trouble? No, only particularly difficult arithmetic examples that The last School Board meeting at must be worked accurately and neatly.

Come with me up the broad staircase to the grammar grade department. Here to our left is a buzz of industry. The exercises observing book-week are being brought to a close. Posters and book reports are being placed on exhibit. A committee hovers over a library display while costumes for a book-character play are being planned and examined in a convenient corner. We cannot linger here as much as we should like to hear the outcome of the tryout for Robin Hood, for just across the hall the Venable seniors, the 7B class, are having oral reports on President Roosevelt's visit to South America. Current events hold sway, newspaper clippings rattle and a long legged youth unable to restrain himself, with uplifted hands, calls out, "Please, may I tell why I think Europe should follow the example of the Americas?

The recess bell interrupts our visit and six boys and girls quietly but quickly reach into six convenient pockets and with the snap of a catch or two have over their shoulders and around their waists the insignia of the Venable School Safety Patrol. And thus you meet the youngest and most useful of Venable's organiza-tions, our School Safety Council, the first organization of this kind in the city schools, which was chartered by the Grammar Grade Association April 4, 1935. Students under the guidance of faculty advisers collected material on the subject and made a careful study, selecting the best points to be used in their own organization. The purpose of the Safety Council is to help pupils by thoughtfulness of others and by proper care of their own actions prevent accidents and dangerous practices by other pupils. Active members constitute the Patrol Squad. Each member is assigned to definite duty, before school, at recesses, on the school bus, in fire drills and immediately after school. On the playgrounds they assist in games and act as arbiters in minor disputes. A large number of the children are associate members. Friendly cooperation seems to be the secret of the success of our youngest organization as well as of the two oldest, namely, the Venable Athletic Association and the Sentinel, both of which date back to February, 1926. Basketball teams properly coached were organized that vear for both boys and girls. Equipment was bought and a refreshment stand was opened for the purpose of building up an athletic fund. In November, 1926, a football team was organized and in the spring of 1927, the first baseball team. During the past ten years the Venable Athletic Asso-ciation has grown in size and influ-the Citizenship Clubs of the departten years the Venable Athletic Asso-

soccer teams, Times-Dispatch medal contests, a swimming class and a "V" club for letter winners. It has touched the lives of many boys and girls who remember their athletics at Venable with pleasure. Every boy and girl participating in Venable athletics not only knows the thrill of the school's athletic songs such as "Red and Black" and "On with the Game", but also the "Fourteen Points of Good Sportsmanship", beginning with, "A good sport plays fair at all times," and ending with, "A good sport is true to his highest ideals." "For when the one great Scorer comes to write against your name, he writesnot that you won or lost—but how you played the game."

The Sentinel

Venable pioneered in the second oldest extra-curricular activity, The Sentinel, her school paper. For more than ten years, the Sentinel has been published continuously. The first issue of the paper contains an article "Do We Have the Proper Spirit?" It seems that the author, P. L. Thomas of the 7A class, was certain that we did have this spirit and his plea was to keep our school bright and shining through the years." The second issue of the Sentinel contains a letter from the late Superintendent E. C. Glass, of the Lynchburg, Virginia, schools. In this letter, Mr. Glass stated that the Lynchburg Grammar Schools published no paper and that "probably his school should take a cue from Charlottesville's schools in this particular." In 1933, representative copies of the paper were sent to the Columbia Scholastic Press Association for criticism. Since that time the staff has endeavored to publish the Sentinel according to the Columbia Press Standards. This year our paper will be entered in the newspaper contest sponsored by the Columbia University Press Association. Writing for the paper has become more and more a vital part of the English work in the Grammar Grades; spelling, writing, composition, pep and originality all enter into the Sentinel work while business managers struggle with figures and labor over exchange lists.

Clubs at Venable

You ask what mean these signs over five of the classroom doors-Robert E. Lee Club, Alexander Hamilton Club, Benjamin Franklin Club, George Washington Club and Our Republic Club. Since I cannot take you to a meeting of each organization, I will ence. It has sponsored a Field Day, mental grades, and had their origin cooked to the taste of any hungry

in 1928 as a part of the study of civics and history. Their purpose is to foster patriotism that is not only faithful but intelligent and to help boys and girls to realize their responsibility to their homes, their schools, their communities and their nation. clubs form a strong link in the chain of friendly cooperation that binds together our boys and girls with a fine school spirit. In the 6A grade, emphasis is placed on the meaning of good citizenship; the 6B follows with a study of the civic virtues; 7A introduces community citizenship with emphasis on local communities and 7B introduces world citizenship, world problems, and vocational guidance. Every Friday brings a meeting with programs planned ahead by members. We try daily to live our citizenship as well as to study about it. Conduct habits and neatness play an important part in winning the Good Citizenship banner. It makes the heart beat quicken to hear forty-eight clear-eyed youngsters pledge their allegiance to the stars and stripes, and then repeat softly the club creed, "I live in one of softly the club creed, "I live in one of the best countries in the world and wish to do all that I can to make it better." Each club member keeps in mind those less fortunate than himself and just before the Christmas holidays, gifts of used but good toys are brought in large numbers to make some one else happy. The many activities entered into by the clubs in the past eight years are too numerous to mention. Each year the club sponsors annual stunt night, the one night in the year, when Venable pupils may share in fun and frolic and also assist in raising funds for the school paper. The Red Cross drive is a yearly activity of the club. Many beautiful historical pictures have been collected and framed by the clubs and hang in the school auditorium. These clubs have assisted in obtaining various flags for the school and in presenting numerous historical programs. Venable club members truly believe that a good citizen is courageous, honest, truthful, loyal, courteous, self reliant, thorough in work and fair in play. Each year one member from the graduating class is chosen by his classmates to receive the Meritorious Citizenship award and have his name engraved upon the Citizenship Cup. Fourteen now have their names engraved upon this silver record.

Lunch Room Service

Let us go down to the lunch room and there you will see seventh grade girls doing a real service for their school. Out of the kitchen they come with steaming bowls of soup, tasty salads, hot chocolate, and hamburgers

The first club members answered the call for their services in the lunch room, and each year members have gladly met this call and done their work willingly and efficiently while every one agrees that the foods are attractive in appearance as well as good to eat. Weekly meetings are held after school. Talks are made on such subjects as, table manners, entertaining guests, good taste in dress and many other similar topics. Occasionally the meeting turns into a merry party and peals of laughter ring through the corridors as appropriate games and contests are enjoyed.

Webster Literary Society

If you will come with me now we have just time to visit a meeting of the Webster Literary Society, a seventh grade organization. This society was organized by the 7B class in December of 1927, for the purpose of discussion and debate. Rules of parliamentary law are carefully observed. Today the program is of a favorite type; "Treasure Island" and "An Old Fashioned Girl" are being dramatized by several members. Captain Billy Bones holds us spellbound by his rowdy ways and sea songs. "An Old Fashioned Girl" surprises us with its quaint characters and clever acting. We are interested in the announcement that at the next meeting there will be a Kipling program, including the singing of Mandalay.

Other Organizations

But we must hurry on as the time approaches 2:30 and the close of your visit. Are there other organizations and activities? Yes, there are homeroom organizations, an honor society (Knights of the Silver Star), the Jefferson Club (a fifth grade organization) the Venable Dramatic Club, the Venable Cavaliers and the Harmonica Band. While Venable does not have organized music instruction. music plays an important part in the daily school life of every boy and girl. New songs for the assemblies are learned by all grades. Vocal and instrumental talents are given recognition. school purchased instruments and proband instruction for the Harmonica Band, thus not only encouraging real talent but providing a hobby for many broblem boys and pleasure for all of the children who delight in performances of the band. All of these or-

ganizations work together in the same friendly cooperation for the advancement of their particular aims.

The Unifying Medium

With the addition of several new organizations a few years ago, the need became apparent for some unifying medium to provide opportunity for closer cooperation among the various groups engaged in carrying on the extra-curricular activities of the school, A committee of seventh grade pupils was selected by the school, to work out, with the aid of two members of the faculty, a scheme for an organization which would include all the separate clubs, societies, etc., and unite them as one body with certain clearly defined aims, at the same time permitting each to carry on independently its chosen activity. Thus came into being the Venable Grammar Grade Association, with a membership including all pupils in grades five, six and seven and all the teachers in this department. Its purposes as stated in the constitution are as follows:

- (1) to unify all student organizations under one control;
- (2) to foster a sentiment of law and order;
- (3) to promote the general activi-

ties of the school; and (4) to develop in the student a growing appreciation of membership in a democracy by providing the educative responsibilities and privileges of participating in such a democracy in the school. The general powers of the Association are vested in a Council bearing the name Venable Patrol and consisting of representatives from all organizations chartered by the As-This Council in cooperation with the faculty sponsors of the sociation. separate organizations supervises all extra-curricular activities of the school and assists in furtherance of various During the last school interests. month of each school term an exciting election for president of the school patrol is held. Friendly rivalry is rampant. Campaign speeches with and without soapbox assistance are wildly applauded. Friends clamor to "take the stump" for their favorite candidate. Platforms and campaign promises are drawn up after much debate and consultation. Election day procedures are in accord with those used by grown-ups and after votes are counted the new president is introduced to the cheering Association. Rival candidates publicly congratulate the winner who makes his response and solemnly takes the oath of office. Article V of the Constitution concerns Honor Points and Awards. The awards are given for scholarship, citizenship, athletics, literary contests,

dramatic clubs, public entertainments and miscellaneous, and the boy or girl who has his honor points read aloud at graduation considers himself most fortunate.

Opportunity Class

You could not have a complete visit to Venable without seeing our Opportunity Class. Venable is fortunate in being able to offer the advantages of specialized instruction to those pupils who find it difficult to adjust themselves to the routine of regular classroom work. Organized in 1933 with an enrollment of twelve pupils, the Opportunity Class is now in its fourth year of service. The successful experience of these four years under competent instructors is proving its value as an important adjunct to the regular work of the school.

The Picture Machine

In the auditorium, chairs are being arranged and curtains pulled in preparation for a movie. Venable is the proud possessor of a fine 16 mm. Bell and Howell Projector, which was bought after several years of eager anticipation and the raising of many small sums from time to time. Generous gifts from many sources increased the amount to the needed sum. The largest contribution, a gift of one hundred and fifteen dollars, was from the Athletic Association.
