The session 1930-1931 was the last school year that elementary pupils were enrolled at the Midway Building. At the opening of the session 1931-1932, the pupils, that previously attended Midway and McGuffey Schools, were reorganized and distributed by buildings as follows: Midway Building to be used only by high school pupils; pupils in elementary grades one to seven in the eastern part of the city by proper zoning were assigned to McGuffey School and to the recently completed George Rogers Clark School, which new building was occupied for the first time during this session 1931-1932. In the October and the November 1936 issues of the Mc-



Guffey Reader may be found a detailed history of Venable, McGuffey and Clark elementary schools.

In May, 1935, Superintendent Frank A. Massie and his wife turned over to me all of the official school records in their possession. Owing to pressure of other duties I had no opportunity to make a detailed examination of these documents until the summer of 1936. On page 109 of the Minute Book that I found in the above records there is an entry of great importance that should be recited at this point. I quote in part as follows:

"Charlottesville, Va.  
June 30th/92.

The Charlottesville City School Board met this day in called meeting at the office of the Chief of Police.—

*Present* Mr. Kaufman, Chairman, Mr. Patton, Dr. McKee, Rev. Mr. Lipscomb, Mr. Gleason.

\* \* \*

Mr. Lipscomb said he would suggest to the Board for consideration the propriety of separating the High School from the Graded School and would bring the matter up hereafter.

Dr. McKee also called attention of the Board to the propriety of establishing a strict examination of pupils who desired to enter the High School."

Mr. Lipscomb's vision for a high school to be organized separate and independent from the elementary grades was not realized until the opening of the session 1931-1932. The period of thirty-nine years from the time that he made his official statement at the above Board meeting is one of deep interest to every student of the history of the high school development in the city.

That accomplished scholar, Dr. A. Robt. McKee, by precept and by example stood for high standards and his conception of students properly prepared to enter the high school has received its complete answer in the type of work done at present in the three white elementary schools, which prepare pupils for Lane High School.

In the Foreword to my "A History of Textbook Selection and Use in Virginia with Particular Reference to the Schools of Charlottesville" published in the January 1937 issue of the McGuffey Reader, I quoted an observation made by William Stubbs in

the Preface to his Constitutional History of England, to the following effect:

"For the roots of the present lie deep in the past, and nothing in the past is dead to the man who would learn how the present comes to be what it is."

The reader may make his own application of this quotation.

## STATE COURSE OF STUDY FOR HIGH SCHOOLS

In 1915 the State Department of Public Instruction issued a bulletin designated as Form T. No. 30, State Course of Study for High Schools, 1915-1916. In this document of eighty-one pages is outlined in detail a course of study in each subject with textbooks to be used including supplementary materials and laboratory equipment for the sciences. This invaluable publication enabled localities to dispense with the printing of any extended outline course of study. All that was necessary for a local school division to print was a leaflet giving in brief form the requirements in each year of work. I am reprinting some of these check lists issued from time to time for the guidance of pupils, parents and teachers in Charlottesville.

OUTLINE COURSE OF STUDY FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL  
AS SHOWN BY CHECK LISTS

For the convenience of parents, pupils and teachers an outline of the course of study for the high school was printed on small sheets, usually five by eight inches in size. The material on these leaflets was arranged in such a manner that a pupil could have at hand a picture of the work he had already completed and could at the same time see what was yet to be finished before graduation. Several of these documents are being reprinted in substance but not in form. The general content of the work in the high school from time to time may be gained by a study of these reproductions of the check lists along with the textbook lists that are being printed below. Each check list should be read in comparison with the book lists for the corresponding years or sessions. A figure in parentheses was used in the book list for 1915 to show the year in which a text was to be studied. Beginning with the session 1924, I arranged the book lists in such a way that they became a course of study showing the year in which each book was to be used and indicating whether the text represented a constant or an elective unit of work. This plan has proved a great convenience to the book dealer, parents, pupils and teachers. The subject matter in the textbooks used has varied very much and the most important factor in any course of study, the quality of the teaching force, cannot be given on paper. There has always been

too much talk about paper schemes for courses of study and the kind of subject matter contained in textbooks and too little about the personality and the training of the teachers, who alone can give spiritual meaning to any statements made in written or printed form.

## CURRICULUM

The subjects taught are English, Mathematics, History, Science, Latin, French, German, Commercial and Normal Training Branches.

GENERAL COURSES (NORMAL, BUSINESS,  
SCIENTIFIC, ETC.)

For graduation in any course, except a foreign language course, eighteen units are required, eleven of which must be the following constants:

English, 4 units; Mathematics, 3 units (algebra and plane geometry); History, 2 units (one of which must be American history and civics); Science, 2 units.

The seven elective units will vary according to the course taken, but when any foreign language (Latin, French or German) is chosen, at least two years must be given to each language elected by a pupil.

## FOREIGN LANGUAGE COURSES

For graduation in the foreign language courses, seventeen units are required, eleven of which must be the constants mentioned above and in addition six units of foreign languages (Latin, French, or German) but at least two years must be given to



each language elected by a pupil. Any pupil taking less than six units of foreign languages will not be considered as taking a foreign language course for graduation but will be classed under a general course. Possible combinations in foreign languages:—

Latin Course French Elective: Latin 4 units; French 2 units.

Latin Course German Elective: Latin 4 units; German 2 units.

Modern Language Course: French 3 units; German 3 units.

General Foreign Language Course: Latin 3 units and French 3 units or German 3 units; or Latin, French and German each 2 units.

##### CURRICULUM

#### FOREIGN LANGUAGE COURSES

For graduation in the foreign language courses, seventeen units are required, eleven of which must be the constants mentioned above and in addition six units of foreign languages (Latin, French, German, or Spanish) but at least two years must be given to each language elected by a pupil. Any pupil taking less than six units of foreign languages will not be considered as taking a foreign language course for graduation but will be classed under a general course. Possible combinations in foreign languages:

Latin Course Modern Language Elective: Latin 4 units and French, German, or Spanish 2 units.

Modern Language Course: French 3 units and German 3 units; or French 3 units and Spanish 3 units; or German 3 units and Spanish 3 units.

General Foreign Language Course: 6 units composed of groups of three units each from any two, or two units each from any three, of the following—Latin, French, German, Spanish.

#### CURRICULUM

The subjects taught are English, Mathematics, History, Science, Latin, French, German, Spanish, and Commercial Branches.

The time allotment given to each study is expressed in units. A unit signifies that the subject has devoted to it five recitation periods of forty minutes each during each week of one full year of at least thirty-six weeks.

The High School curriculum as a whole is composed of constants or required units which must be taken by every pupil and electives which may be selected under the guidance and approval of the teachers, principal and superintendent.

#### GENERAL COURSES (BUSINESS, SCIENTIFIC, ETC.)

For graduation in any course, except a foreign



language course, eighteen units are required, eleven of which must be the following constants:

English, 4 units; Mathematics, 3 units (algebra and plane geometry); History, 2 units (one of which must be American history and civics); Science, 2 units.

The seven elective units will vary according to the course taken, but when any foreign language (Latin, French, German, or Spanish) is chosen, at least two years must be given to each language elected by a pupil.

#### FOREIGN LANGUAGE COURSES

For graduation in the foreign language courses, seventeen units are required, eleven of which must be the constants mentioned above and in addition six units of foreign languages (Latin, French, German, or Spanish) but at least two years must be given to each language elected by a pupil. Any pupil taking less than six units of foreign languages will not be considered as taking a foreign language course for graduation but will be classed under a general course. Possible combinations in foreign languages:

Latin Course Modern Language Elective: Latin 4 units and French, German, or Spanish 2 units.

Modern Language Course: French 3 units and German 3 units; or French 3 units and Spanish 3 units; or German 3 units and Spanish 3 units.

General Foreign Language Course: 6 units composed of groups of three units each from any two, or two units each from any three, of the following—Latin, French, German, Spanish.
